Breaking open the Word

The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him.

Eating unites us with the food eaten and lets the food sustain us. We are what we eat. When we eat, the food will nourish our body according to its quality. Healthy food provides the necessary nutrition for the organs to function correctly, unhealthy food causes malfunctioning in the organs. With this simple logic, Jesus showed people the necessity of merging oneself into Him through Holy Communion.

Does the communion we consume change us? If we count how many Holy Communion we have consumed to the present, we must be saints already. Consuming His Body and Blood in the Eucharist is our effort to take part of His Divinity, to be one with Jesus Christ. However, besides consuming Holy Communion in the Eucharist, Jesus also talked about consuming the words of God as food from heaven. By consuming His Words and Teaching and applying it into our lives, we adopt Jesus' way of life ourselves. That is the true meaning to be one with the body and blood of Jesus, adopting His way of life.

Eucharist begins with the Liturgy of the Word first. The meaning is that we accept Jesus Christ if we accept not only Holy Communion but also His words. By embracing His words, we expect that we will be transformed to be like Him: compassionate, forgiving, humble, honest, tender, smart and yet sincere. If these qualities of character appear in our lives then what we eat has already transformed us.

May we honor the Body and Blood of Christ by letting the words of Jesus sink into our hearts. For what God wants the most is the change in our hearts. This is the sign that we are really united with and are like His Son, Jesus.

Daily Prayer

There is nothing like the Sermon on the Mount to help us hear the message of Jesus, and to let ourselves be addressed by those words. All of us can ask for these graces with real specificity, that is, with real people and real daily circumstances in mind. We know with whom we need to "turn the other cheek" and to love more. We know the circumstances in which we are tempted to "be religious" in the right circumstances only.

Upon reflection, each of us can take the time to "locate" our hearts, by discovering what we tend to treasure. We can check ourselves out by making a list of the "five most important things" to me. Then we can make a list of the five things I spend most of my time on. Comparing the lists will help us get concrete about asking the Lord for the grace we need to put our lives back in balance, if we aren't. All of us can name what we worry about. And so we can all ask for the graces to "seek first" the Kingdom of God.

All of this reflection can happen throughout the week in the background of our daily life, if we get into the habit of focusing for a few moments each morning. If we take just 30 seconds, at the edge of our bed each morning, it will begin to establish a habit of living more reflectively.

Thank you for this day, Lord. Help me to be focused today on not getting so hooked by Ann's ways or Bob's harsh words. I need your grace to place my trust in you. Help me especially before I have to talk with Ann on the phone and let me stay focused before Bill comes home from work.

Our version of a brief moment with the Lord - friend to friend - can be repeated and made more specific, while we are going about our day. Some days, we might have 20 such moments of prayerful conversation with our Lord - guided by the Word, the desires that are surfacing, and the events of our daily lives. And, each night, we can give thanks for this deeper relationship with the Lord that is developing in my heart.

Among the compelling Eucharistic themes proclaimed in today's readings is the notion of "participation" as found in Saint Paul's letter to the Corinthians. Good stewards are part of a Eucharistic family: loving, welcoming, serving. An important part of living as a steward comes about in the many ways we can participate in the life of the Church.

No matter how much time we have to give, no matter what our skills or interests, no matter what our level of commitment, there is a way to participate as a good steward to enrich our lives and the lives of others to build up the Body of Christ. How do you participate in the life of your parish?




Kalaupapa is only accessible to invited guests and Bishop Larry Silva has made special arrangements, through Seawind Tours & Travel, Inc.,

for a limited number of visitors to accompany him as he visits this spiritual place.

This Kalaupapa Pilgrimage with Bishop Larry Silva includes round-trip charter air transportation from Honolulu, ground transportation in Kalaupapa, a special Mass celebrated at St. Philomena Church, a guided tour of Kalaupapa and Kalawao narrated by a Kalaupapa Historian and a picnic-style lunch. The tour operates from approximately 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. . The cost of the day trip is \$399.00 per-person and early registration is recommended as space is limited.
